The Sewanee School of Letters will host a series of public events during its summer session in June and July. You are invited to attend these conversations and readings with visiting faculty and guest authors.

The series kicks off the summer with a conversation and book signing with authors Patrick Dean and Rachel Martin at the University Bookstore on Monday, June 5, at 5:30 p.m., with School of Letters Director Justin Taylor. Books will be available for sale. Dean's new book on the naturalist Mark Catesby is "Nature's Messenger," and his first book, a Sewanee favorite, is "A Window to Heaven" about adventurer, reformer, and Episcopal priest Hudson Stuck.

Martin's new book is "A Most Tolerant Little Town," about the first school in Tennessee to attempt court-ordered desegregation after the Brown v. Board of Education ruling. Martin is also the author of "Hot, Hot Chicken," which recounts the history of Nashville's Black communities through the story of its hot chicken scene.

Jimmy Wilson at the Blue Chair will offer Nashville hot chicken as part of the dinner menu at the Blue Chair immediately following the June 5 book signing.

Save the date for two special events in mid-June: Poet Matthew Olzmann, this year's John Grammer Fellow, will read in Naylor Auditorium in Gailor Hall on Wednesday, June 14, at 4:30 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Blake & Bailey Family Fund.

SUD: Audit Good; Water Loss Troubling

"SUD showed a net positive change in position," said Sewanee Utility District Board President Charlie Smith, commenting on the 2022 audit reviewed at the May 16 commissioners' meeting. Less favorable was SUD manager Ben Beavers' report on operations which showed unaccounted-for water loss had more than doubled since the previous month.

Reviewing the audit, Smith said he was surprised to learn the University accounted for 34 percent of SUD's customers. Beavers said at one time the University had accounted for 40 percent of the customer base. Beavers pointed out that in addition to showing SUD's strong financial standing and decreasing debt, the auditors reported no "findings" calling for corrections in SUD's financial practices in the 2022 audit or in the prior year's 2021 audit.

Beavers speculated the sharp increase in unaccounted-for water loss resulted from plastic meters installed eight years ago when SUD replaced all the meters in the district. Unaccounted-for water loss is water produced at the plant that does not register on customer meters. Unaccounted-for water loss had been steadily declining and had dropped to 15.3 percent but shot up to 37.6 percent for the month of March. SUD had already undertaken replacing the plastic meters which Beavers called "a badly designed product." Beavers attributed the increase in water loss to meter failure since the decrease in sales correlated with the percentage of in-town customers, and the meters of Jump Off area customers had already been replaced. 

might need to amend the budget to reflect the need for stepping up meter replacement, Beavers said.

Looking to the future, Beavers said the University was considering constructing apartments along Highway 41A between Alabama Avenue and Kennerly Avenue. The Sewanee Village Ventures plan proposed a 60-unit complex. Beavers said the aging cast-iron sewer line would likely need replaced to handle the increased load; currently only a few customers are connected in the area proposed for the construction. The University recommended SUD do a "cursory study" of the line, Beavers said. He speculated the University would help pay for the project.

Beavers hopes the flow meters needed for the study can be purchased with the TDEC administered American Recovery Plan grant money SUD will receive. Beavers recently learned SUD's grant had been approved. He was advised he could begin purchasing materials, but not to enter into any contracts yet, as the contractual mechanism had not yet been determined. SUD's major grant project will be to reduce inflow and infiltration of ground water into the sanitary sewer system, and flow meters will be needed to measure the success of the rehabilitation, Beavers said. The flow meters could also be used to assess possible sewer upgrades needed for the apartments project.

SCCF Announces 2023 Spring Grant Recipients

South Cumberland Community Fund has approved grants to 13 organizations across the Plateau totaling \$100,000. With this year's grants, the community fund has awarded over \$1.4 million since 2012. Both new and past grant recipients will be recognized at the Celebration for the Plateau event to be held at Kennerly Hall at the Parish of St. Mark and St. Paul, 216 University Avenue, Sewanee, at noon, Saturday, June 10, 2023.

"We are delighted that the 13 applicants chosen for this round of grants will mainly focus on strengthening our local economy, building the health and well-being of our Plateau residents, enhancing the beauty & accessibility of our natural wonders, and educating our students," said Marguerite Lloyd, board chair. "We believe funding these organizations will promote economic growth across the Plateau and help bring our communities together."

The following organizations will receive grants in the 2023 spring cycle:

BetterFi – \$2,500 for the purchase of event equipment and supplies that will be used to enhance organizational appearance, provide greater flexibility, and spread awareness at community events about financial assistance programs available to Plateau residents.

Community Action Committee (CAC) – \$6,000 to increase the effectiveness of the Emergency Assistance Program by developing an education series program that will teach money management, energy, and water conservation strategies.

Tracy City Free Clinic (Christians Celebrating God's Bounty, Inc.) – \$10,000 for care and prevention of Hepatitis C patients in the Plateau community. This invisible, diseased population will receive testing, care plans, and medications, (as well as publicity and education for the larger community).

Dependable Laundry – \$8,160 to upgrade laundry equipment thereby providing job and career training as well as post-secondary learning for special education students from Grundy County High School.

Folks at Home – \$3,000 to renovate and upgrade the Folks at Home public bathroom facility in downtown Sewanee for compli-

ance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990. Thus, providing a more "inclusive and welcoming" facility to disabled persons in Sewanee and the Cumberland Plateau as a whole.

Friends of South Cumberland Park – \$10,000 to grow enrollment at Cumberland Forest School in their nature-based education program for 3-5 year old children from the Cumberland Plateau.

Grundy County Saddle Club – \$8,500 to install 10 camping stations on the show grounds thereby providing hikers and visitors a peaceful location on the Cumberland Plateau (as well as families needing services during events).

Housing Sewanee Inc. – \$10,000 to purchase the HVAC system and kitchen appliances for their third home in the Sherwood Spring neighborhood (and 19th overall) which will be starting this summer.

MARC - Marion Animal Resource Connection – \$3,340 to provide free clinics in various locations across the Cumberland Plateau and inoculate dogs for Canine Distemper, Adenovirus, Parainfluenza, & Parvovirus (DAPP) vaccines, (as well as providing microchips and printing ID tags).

The Mosaic Recovery Center – \$10,000 to provide a better living experience (as well as job skill training), through kitchen improvements for the 26 Plateau residents in their addiction recovery center.

Sewanee Community Chest – \$8,500 to convert the exterior and parking lot of Sewanee's Depot building into a trailhead and information center for the Mountain Goat Trail. This will include parking lot improvements, benches, signage, and landscaping.

St. Mark's Community Association – \$10,000 to preserve and enhance this community center as an event location for members, Cumberland Plateau residents, and other groups as an historical landmark, and the last remaining non-housing community structure dating back to the cornerstone of the University of the South.

Town of Tracy City – \$10,000 to replace and install better lighting (including new poles and LED lighting) on the Tracy City football field thereby making it safer for children to play and encouraging

more participation.

In June, the Community Fund will begin the process for its "Connect for Lasting Impact" grant round. Two or more organizations can apply together for up to \$60,000 to launch a project that will benefit the entire Plateau community and help build hope and prosperity for all. The kickoff event will be on June 6 at Morton Memorial UMC, and all eligible organizations on the Plateau are invited to attend.

Established in 2012, South Cumberland Community Fund works to improve the quality of life across the Plateau by increasing philanthropy and supporting leadership of the area's communities, schools, and nonprofit organizations. Since its founding, the community fund has reinvested nearly \$2 million in projects that benefit the Plateau.

Next, they dig into homestyle chicken and cinnamon bread at Dollywood. To round out the day, the crew goes hog wild at a pit stop in Madisonville, and at a bacon legend Benton's Smoky Mountain Country Hams.

In South Pittsburg, Guy gets a tour that most chefs only dream about at the Lodge Cast Iron Foundry, where he learns how cast-iron cookware is made from raw material to finished product. Then it's over to Sewanee, to check out Midway Mushrooms where they produce a wide variety of gourmet mushrooms. Next, the families load up on southern sweets at a bakery that has been around for 120 years, Dutch Maid Bakery. Then, things get a little wild in Chattanooga when the families battle it out in a mechanical bull competition. They also head to the Tennessee Aquarium in Chattanooga, where the Fieris make a recipe to feed to the lemurs. For the last day of the trip, they head back to Nashville to make custom cowboy hats and enjoy authentic Tennessee barbecue to close out the epic trip around Appalachia.

A Chat and This and That

David Rowe reported an unusually poor morel season this year. He also observed a Yellow-breasted Chat calling and displaying in a remarkable way. The Audubon website describes it thus: "During courtship, male displays to female by pointing bill up and swaying from side to side." He shared a video of this unusual behavior — a bit bizarre. It has been classified with warblers but according to eBird it is now in its own family with calls and behavior quite different from warblers.

On May 9, Leslie Lytle reported another unusual experience with a first lightning bug: "... just after dusk sitting on the porch ...It lit on the page in a book of poems I was reading, crawled around a bit exploring and flashing its abdomen, then flew away. No other sign of lightning bugs in my yard or garden where they will likely be abundant later. It was an unusual experience, for sure!"

The Yellowwood in front of the Hospitality Shop is in bloom — check it out. This species sometimes only blooms every 2-3 years. In the "wild" it can be found in rich hardwood forests, often over limestone, in the Eastern U.S. and especially in the Southern Appalachians. It looks similar to Black Locust but the leaflets on its compound leaves are alternate rather than opposite, an unusual trait.

We have had dogwood winter and blackberry winter, but what to call these chilly spells like last weekend in late May or even June? Leonard King says that locally they are called "cotton britches winter" — after they have passed, it is safe to get out of your union suit and into your "cotton britches."
