



University Commencement Weekend, May 6-8

The University of the South's 2021-22 academic year comes to a close May 6, 7, and 8 with three ceremonies marking graduation weekend on the Mountain.

The University of the South will hold a Convocation for Conferring of Degrees for the School of Theology on Friday, May 6; the University Baccalaureate on Saturday, May 7; and a Convocation for Conferring of Degrees for the College of Arts and Sciences on Sunday, May 8. All events will begin at 10 a.m. in All Saints' Chapel and will be live-streamed for those unable to attend in person <<https://new.sewanee.edu/parents-families/commencement/live-stream/>>.

Honorary degrees will be presented to the Rt. Rev. Dr. Glenda S. Curry and the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings during the School of Theology Commencement on Friday. Bishop Glenda Curry will give the baccalaureate address at the University's Baccalaureate ceremony on Saturday.

On Sunday, May 8, commencement exercises will be held in All Saints' Chapel and on the Quadrangle for the College of Arts and Sciences. More than 415 students will graduate from the College. The presentation of diplomas will take place on the Quad so that families and guests may see the conferral live, and the entire service on closed-circuit TV.

Awards and honors will be announced, concluding with the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion for character, leadership, and service to the University and the Sewanee community—the University's highest award.

The valedictory address will be followed by the conferral of degrees, and Acting Vice-Chancellor Nancy Berner will read the University's charge to the graduates. The traditional Sewanee recessional takes the new graduates through a corridor of faculty members who line the sidewalk outside the Chapel—and takes them into an outpouring of applause and cheers. The graduates, families, and guests will be able to continue their celebration during a luncheon honoring the Class of 2022.

LiveWell on the Mountain

Folks at Home and Arcadia at Sewanee have joined in sponsoring a major new initiative to enable older adults to age in place here. The new program, LiveWell on the Mountain, is being offered to healthy independent-living residents in the Sewanee and Monteagle area through Blakeford Senior Life, the Nashville based not-for-profit parent of the Blakeford at Green Hills continuing care retirement community founded in 1996. It will be an extension of the successful LiveWell By Blakeford program in the Nashville area.

LiveWell on the Mountain was introduced to guests at a reception held on April 28 at the Sewanee Inn where George Elliott, Chair of Arcadia at Sewanee, Craig Stubblebine, President of Folks at Home, and David Shipp, the University's Vice President of Economic Development and Community Relations, each welcomed this new service to the Mountain. While there are no legal ties between these entities and LiveWell, Arcadia at Sewanee and Folks at Home played leading roles in establishing the connection with LiveWell.

Brian Barnes, President and CEO of Blakeford Senior Life, and Jane Kelley, Executive Director of LiveWell By Blakeford, presented information on the company and, specifically, the features and benefits of the LiveWell's aging in place program. Historically, the choice for healthy older adults who want a plan in place has been either to relocate to a community where life care is an option, or to stay at home and depend on the provisions of a long-term care insurance plan. LiveWell offers a third option that includes a Folks at Home membership and, among other services, personalized care coordination, wellness programs, transportation to essential services, home care assistance, and, when necessary, priority access to the Blakeford residential communities.

Reappraisal Program Nears Completion

In the next few days, property owners in Franklin County will receive a change notice in the mail titled "Assessment Change Notice," said Bruce Spencer, Assessor of Property. This is not a tax bill. It reflects the market value of a property as determined by the Department of Property Assessment with the State of Tennessee during the county-wide revaluation program.

Property taxes are determined by applying the local tax rate to the assessment for each property. The tax rate is determined by each city and county governing body based on its budgetary needs.

The assessor of property and his staff will be available to discuss the new appraisals with the property owners who have questions or who disagree with their new values. If you plan to visit the assessor's office, we ask that you please call ahead for an appointment although this is not mandatory for the informal hearings. Property owners still in disagreement with the new appraisal after the meeting with the assessor's office may then appeal to the County Board of Equalization.

The County Board of Equalization will meet beginning on June 1 through June 14, 2022 to allow property owners who disagree with the new appraisal an opportunity to offer evidence supporting what they believe the actual value of their property to be. Property owners still dissatisfied with their appraisal after meeting with the County Board of Equalization may then appeal to the State Board of Equalization.

State law requires that, in the year of reappraisal, each taxing jurisdiction must establish a tax rate referred to as the "Certified Tax Rate," which will generate the same total revenue as the previous year thereby preventing governments from increasing revenues due to a reappraisal. The local governing body may, however, pass a tax increase by adopting a tax rate higher than the certified rate, but a public hearing must be held with the advertised intent of exceeding the certified rate in order to do so.

Property owners with agricultural, forest or open space land may be eligible for relief under what is commonly called the Greenbelt Law. This law allows certain land to be taxed based on its present use instead of market value. The "Use Value" appraisal will usually be less than the "Market Value" appraisal. Property owners should contact the county assessor of property for assistance in filling out the "Greenbelt" application.

State law provides for property tax relief to certain low-income homeowners age 65 or over, certain permanently and totally disabled homeowners and certain disabled veterans. Property owners should contact the County Trustee for details on the Property Tax Relief Programs.

University Hiring Freeze Crisis: Thaw in Sight

On April 8, the University faculty passed a resolution in a near unanimous vote calling for immediate action to address the "dire need" created by 27 open tenure track positions resulting from the hiring freeze that began in March 2020. Of the faculty attending the meeting, 96 voted in favor of the resolution, 4 abstained, and none were opposed. By month's end, the number of open tenure track positions had risen to 29. The freeze "has gutted course offerings and led to insufficient tenure-line faculty to carefully and consistently engage with students," the resolution argued, with students struggling to find advisors and shutout of required courses. Now, though, hope has pushed its way to center stage.

"The hiring freeze is thawing," said associate professor of history Nick Roberts.

According to acting Vice-Chancellor Nancy Berner and acting Provost Scott Wilson, in response to the resolution, the University has authorized hiring 15 tenure track faculty over the next two years, nine in the academic year 2022-2023.

Engagement Session for National EV Infrastructure Formula Program

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) (also known as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, or BIL) includes a total of up to \$7.5 billion in dedicated funding to help make electric vehicle (EV) charging stations accessible to all Americans for local and long-distance trips. That funding includes a \$5 billion National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program that helps states create a network of EV charging stations along Alternative Fuel Corridors designated by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).

A series of stakeholder engagement sessions across Tennessee to solicit feedback and answer questions on the State's planning process will begin. At 5 p.m., Tuesday, May 10, there will be a meeting in the conference room on the Monteagle City Hall, 16 Dixie Lee Hwy.


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Church News

On April 26, area Democrats gathered at the Franklin County Annex to meet one of the candidates in the Democratic primary for governor of Tennessee, Memphis City Councilman and lawyer, J.B. The hiring freeze was put in place due to uncertainty about future enrollment, Berner and Wilson explained. Roberts said initially the reason “made sense” given the pandemic. But the administration also voiced concerns about the anticipated “demographic cliff” which projected a drastically reduced number of students attending college by 2026.

Berner said the hiring freeze remained in effect as part of the strategic planning process to evaluate “curricular renewal and innovation.” In December 2021, department chairs identified acute needs in the departments of psychology, mathematics, and politics. The administrations authorized hiring several tenure track professors, but some searches failed to yield results. Watching the precipitous decline in tenured faculty, professors worried entire programs and departments would be cut, said Jennifer Mathews, chair of the theater department. “It’s like we’re trying to go into 2026 in a weak position,” Mathews insisted. Meanwhile, “The students we have in 2022 are suffering.” In the psychology department where the tenured faculty has decreased by more than half, tenured faculty must advise two dozen or more students. Only tenured faculty have the experience needed to serve as advisors and to serve on committees, Berner acknowledged, roles visiting professors cannot fill.

University records show from the spring of 2020 to the spring of 2022, visiting professors increased from 27 to 38 and full-time faculty decreased from 146 to 136. (Note: full-time professors include teaching professors hired on five-year contracts.)

Some visiting assistant profes-

sors (VAPs) have served on the faculty almost five years, on contracts typically renewed annually, said one VAP who spoke anonymously to the Messenger. He moonlights at a second job to make ends meet and regrets not having more time for his students. Set to interview for a tenure track position when the hiring freeze went into effect, now his life is on hold. He has applied for other positions and may leave academia. He takes hope in recently being offered a three-year VAP contract. Mathews said VAPs hire in at just \$45,000 annually. She pointed to a VAP who recently took a tenured position at another college with a far higher pay scale.

Easing the faculty’s concerns about elimination of departments and programs, Wilson, who heads up the strategic planning process, said, the University intended to “avoid eliminating programs with tenure track positions...a goal [is] to have 80 percent of the faculty in academic departments be tenure-track faculty or teaching professors.” Increasing the number of teaching professors was not part of “the overall plan,” Berner noted. Two of the nine positions to be filled this year are in the department of psychology and two are in the department of mathematics, departments with multiple open tenure track lines.

“Hopefully things will be more reassuring once we have these positions filled,” Roberts observed. “The town is the college, and the college is the town.”

Echoing the sentiment of everyone interviewed for this story, Berner said, “We all have the same objective, supporting our students, faculty, and employees. We’re all pulling together in the same direction.”

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SEWANEE VILLAGE UPDATE

As the University moves to begin new projects initiated by plans approved in recent years, quite a bit of progress is being made on Village related projects that are already underway.

The road construction on Highway 41-A continues to move toward completion. At this point, you may have noticed sod installation and a new shift in the traffic pattern near the intersection of 41-A and University Avenue. TDOT has begun Phase II of roadway improvements, which will now address the southern portion of the project. This phase will initially focus on excavation for drainage structures but will also include new curb and gutter, a sidewalk wide enough to bring the Mountain Goat Trail through the Village, crosswalks, and new driving lanes. A new anticipated completion date is mid-August with final paving and striping occurring at the end of the project.

In early April, a panel of land-use planning experts from the Urban Land Institute (ULI) spent a week in Sewanee considering possibilities for residential and commercial endeavors, and how much of the Village planning from recent years may become reality. Since 1947, ULI's Advisory Services Panel program has helped more than 750 communities find independent, strategic, and practical solutions for the most challenging land-use issues. While in Sewanee, the panel toured the community and surrounding areas, reviewed planning documents, and interviewed many University employees and students, business owners, and other community members. The week concluded with a presentation of findings and recommendations focused on moving Village projects forward. The presentation can be found on the Leases and Community Relations website: <<https://new.sewanee.edu/offices/university-offices/leases-and-community-relations/>>.

Finally, you may be aware that the University has created a new subsidiary called Sewanee Village Ventures Inc., (SVV). This entity is governed by nine board members and is tasked with proposing and implementing various residential housing and commercial development projects designed to help enrich the experience of the entire community. All SVV initiatives will take the form of proposals and will be reviewed and approved by the University's Board of Regents. At the top of the agenda is identifying near-term investments with clear and strategic benefits. Some projects will leverage recommendations from the excellent ULI study. The SVV board is beginning its work in earnest, and we expect to make more announcements over the course of 2022.

Come in and Explore the World


Last week at the Hospitality Shop a donation of a crafted wooden box about 8 inches by 10 inches came in. On the front was a small pull handle. The lid lifted back to reveal a six column rack of small one inch wooden balls. The base was a green felt lined box with the message: “Mystery Game?” An hour later an enterprising college student had taken a picture and googled the quest to find that this was a French game designed to be played while cognac aged. She promised to come back and teach the staff the game once she learned the rules.

While the Sewanee heritage was once predominately white and often male, we now live in a more diverse community, and its multilingual, multicultural foundation surfaces over and over again in the donations the Shop receives. We had a wall hanging that a Vietnam vet identified as a mural depicting an attack on an Asian village. African seminarians have provided the history for a set of masks made of the gods of nature for a tribe. Someone gifted a set of Chinese warrior statues from an exhibit in Atlanta. Sewanee-ites travel far and wide and bring home treasures.

Recently a customer identified a framed casual picture of Tennessee Williams in front of a cabin somewhere. We receive books written in at least four foreign languages: French, Spanish, Russian, and Chinese. We have unmatched cups and saucers and plates of old wedding china from Bristol, England and Limoges, France that are nearly 100 years old.

This summer, give yourself an hour to come in and browse. The Shop is designed for wandering. Imagine yourself among other small towns from around the world. If you are donating an unusual piece, and it need not be large or valuable, include a note that explains its heritage and its long journey to Sewanee. The next owner will value the story.

We'll be open all summer, except the weekend of July 2, for our usual hours, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday, and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday. Coming up June 3 is our annual gathering for volunteers and the larger community. More details soon. 

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SAS Varsity Track Team Wraps Up Season at Home

On April 29, St. Andrew's-Sewanee School varsity track and field team hosted seven teams (Cascade, Coffee County, Middle Tennessee Christian School, Sale Creek, Silverdale, and Webb) in their final regular season meet. Jocelyn Covaney also scored for Sewanee, as she clocked in at 16.88 seconds in the 100-meter hurdle final.

After running the 10K on Friday, Patrick Rodriguez responded with a new season-best in the 5,000 meters, clocking in at 17:38.31.

Christian Shushok ran a 17:27.84 in the 5K, and later, he posted a 4:41.96 in the 1,500 meters.

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Women's Lacrosse Drops SAA Champs Contest

The University of the South women's lacrosse team had a 12-9 deficit with less than eight minutes remaining in the third period, but that would be as close as they would get as Rhodes College won the 2022 Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Women's Lacrosse Tournament Championship, 25-12, May 1, from Mason Field.

The top-seeded Lynx netted the first six goals of the game, but a man-up goal by Ellie Tate Schutte started a string of three straight for the Tigers to make it a 6-3 score after 15 minutes.

The Tigers had a man-down goal by Schutte to make it a 7-4 game, but the Lynx went off with a 5-1 run to lead 12-5 with 13:16 left in the third quarter.

Sewanee did not go away, as the Purple Tigers scored four straight goals. Hadley Meadows scored twice in the span, including a man-up goal to make it a 12-9 score with 7:49 left in the third.

Unfortunately, for Rhodes, they would pull away for good, as they scored six of the next seven.

Sewanee finishes the 2022 campaign with 14 wins, matching the 2017 team as the second-best total in program history.

Molly Morris, Hattie Fogarty and Hadley Meadows were selected to the All-Tournament team.

Hattie Fogarty won eight draw controls and tallied five points thanks to a hat trick and two assists.

She becomes the first player in program history to achieve 100 points in a season, as she finishes with 104. The senior is also the new record-holder in goals in a season (71) and draw controls (98).

Hadley Meadows and Ellie Tate Schutte each had a hat trick in the game. Meadows also added three draws.

Molly Morris (11-5) made 16 saves and forced two turnovers in goal.

Men's Lacrosse Wins Fifth SAA Tournament Championship

The University of the South men's lacrosse team won its fifth Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Tournament Championship on Sunday with a 10-9 victory over Rhodes College, May 1, from the South Campus Field on the campus of Centre College.

The teams would trade goals back-and-forth for the first half. Jack Westfall gave Sewanee the 4-3 lead with 8:49 left, but a Lynx goal in the final seconds evened the contest at four goals apiece.

Sewanee got the offense going early and often in the third stanza. Will Wyckoff helped Sewanee reclaim the lead, 5-4, with 12:20 left in the period. After a Greg Ix save, Ryan Hofstetter netted an unassisted goal to make it 6-4.

The Tigers would win the ensuing face off thanks to Charlie Warren and Alec Jazari picking up the loose ball. Wyckoff came up later and scored again with 9:37 left in the quarter.

After a Rhodes goal that made the game 7-4 in favor of the Tigers, Wyckoff and Davis Gillenwater pushed the lead to 9-5 after three quarters of play.

It was a different story early in the fourth quarter, as the Lynx netted three straight to make it a one-goal game, 9-8, with less than nine minutes remaining in regulation.

Luke Valentine gave Sewanee some insurance with his unassisted goal with 6:28 left, but Rhodes would respond with a goal at the 4:34 mark to make it a 10-9 score.

The Lynx had three chances to even the game late, but a costly turnover by Rhodes in the final seconds lifted Sewanee to the SAA Championship.

Rhodes College and the University of the South played for the SAA Championship for the third time in the history of the league. With Sunday's win, it was the second time that Sewanee defeated Rhodes in the title game.

Sewanee wins its fifth SAA Tournament Championship on Sunday (2013-15-16-17-22). The program is in its 15th season.

With the victory, the Tigers will make the return to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2017. This will be the sixth appearance for the Tigers in the Championships (2013-14-15-16-17).

Luke Valentine and Will Wyckoff each scored three points for the Tigers on Sunday. Valentine laced a hat trick, while Wyckoff scored twice and added an assist.

Davis Gillenwater and Devon Root each added a goal and an assist. Jack Selner and Carlton Ward each forced four turnovers on defense, while Selner also scooped up four ground balls.

Charlie Warren won 11-of-21 face offs, and Greg Ix (5-4) matched a career-high in saves with 14.

Women's Tennis Rolls to Eighth SAA Tournament Crown

The No. 7 University of the South women's tennis team finished a perfect weekend at the 2022 Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Women's Tennis Tournament, as the Tigers blanked its third straight opponent in Rhodes, 5-0, May 1, from the Adams Tennis Complex at Old Fort Park.

The Tigers picked up three more doubles wins on Sunday, as the team is now 59-10 this spring.

Brooke Despriet/Alice Hall (16-3), Ansley Carpenter/Natalia Nassar (19-1) and Emma Smith/Nicole Nowak (10-3) all picked up wins on Sunday in doubles.

In singles, Smith (13-5) and Carpenter (15-5) won their matches by identical 6-0, 6-1 scores.

With the win, Sewanee achieves 20 wins in a season. The program has accomplished this for the 11th time in program history.

It was the eighth SAA Tournament Championship for the Tigers, but all-time the program has won 14 league titles (1987-89-90-91-92-2007-13-14-15-16-17-18-19).

Sewanee is 24-0 all-time in SAA Tournament matches.

The program also earned the automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championships. This will be Sewanee's 28th appearance in the tournament, the fifth-most among NCAA Division III schools.

Men's Tennis Captures Eighth SAA Tourney Title

The No. 33 University of the South men's tennis team won the program's eighth Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Men's Tennis Tournament Championship, as the Tigers downed the Colonels of Centre College, 5-1, May 1, from the Adams Tennis Complex at Old Fort Park.

The Tigers took two of three in doubles, led by Quinn Wicklund and Peyton Erck's 8-1 win at the No. 1. The duo improves to 9-4 on the year.

Quinn Wicklund (13-8) won his fifth straight match with his win at the No. 4 flight, while Jackson Davis (9-7) earned his seventh consecutive victory thanks to his dub at the No. 6.

Gil Weston (12-7) clinched the match for Sewanee, as he posted a 6-2, 4-6, 6-1 victory for his 10th straight win.

With the win, Sewanee secured its eighth SAA Tournament Championship on Sunday. (2013-14-15-16-17-18-19-22). Sewanee remains undefeated (24-0) in SAA Tournament matches.

Playing in the program's 98th season, Sewanee recorded its 23rd conference championship.

Sewanee makes the return to the NCAA Tournament, as the team earned its 18th appearance to the championship on Sunday (1989-93-95-96-97-98-2000-01-02-03-06-14-15-16-17-18-19-22).

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NATURENOTES

Flowers Overhead

If one looks up (safely!) while driving down the mountain toward Cowan, two blooming woody plants stand out this week. One is a tree, black locust, with drooping clusters of white flowers. Black locust is one of the trees that colonizes abandoned fields and other disturbed areas. It is shade-intolerant, so when other types of trees get established and shade it out, it dies. Its presence in mixed oak-hickory woods, for example, tells us that the land was a field or a pasture or maybe a clearcut not that long ago. It is a member of the bean family, as is evident in its fruits, and as such has nitrogen-fixing bacteria in its root nodules. One interesting note about black locust is that after the last glaciation, it survived only in the Southern Appalachians. It is now spread through the continental United States and Canada, and even in Europe, where cultivars are planted.

The other plant is a woody vine, crossvine. The “cross” in the name comes from the fact that a cross-section of the vine reveals a pattern of a Greek cross, with equal arms. The pattern of the evergreen leaves, in opposite pairs, also has some resemblance to a cross. Its orange and yellow flowers, similar to trumpet creeper but smaller, are found high in the canopy where the vine has climbed using tendrils that attach to bark and twigs. Often, one only becomes aware that it has bloomed when finding the flowers fallen beneath the vine, as we noticed in our driveway earlier this week. All other members of its genus are tropical dwellers. Hummingbirds are attracted to the bright orange color of the flowers.



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


