# Sewanee Airport Tree **Cutting** Rife with Controversy

At a May 3 town meeting at the Sewanee Elementary School, University Director of Business Services Sam McNair discussed the Sewanee-Franklin County Airport's need to pursue easements to allow for tree cutting. Residents voiced multiple objections, chief among them, the University's lack of communication.

McNair explained the airport was not in compliance with Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) regulations and had operated on a provisional license since 2017. The airport receives \$150,000 annually in grant money for capital improvements such as paving the runway, according to port come into compliance before undertaking additional capital the way of [compliance] is trees,"



"I'm really encouraged about McNair insisted. "We want to negotiate an easement."

Asked about plans to expand the airport and extend the runway, McNair said, "Nothing new is going to happen. There will be no new

One property owner proposed cutting the trees himself. "As far as the county is concerned, that would suffice," Alexander said. "It may not suffice with the FAA and TDOT."

A Midway property owner pointed out the airport could charge hanger fees of \$400 per month and realize \$150,000 in revenue, making the grant money unnecessary. He said FAA project manager Adam Guy advised him the University would get their easement because if the airport failed to come into compliance, they would need to return the grant money.

In response to a question about the airport acquiring easements by eminent domain, Alexander said it would take his signature or a vote by the county commission. "They won't get that. However, we are talking about the FAA. That's a horse of a different color."

A non-Midway area resident observed the easement was needed so the airport would not need to renegotiate the arrangement each time the property changed hands.

One Midway resident said she did not feel safe with planes flying so low. A neighboring property owner said the planes would fly lower with

Pressed about what the next step would be if no agreement on easements could be reached, McNair said, "It's negotiation for removing trees without an easement."

County Commissioner Johnny Hughes cited the success of Frank Gladu's Village Planning meetings and recommended the county and University adopt a similar communication approach.

of war vets, hunters, trappers, a mapmaker, one British thrill-seeker and a cook deal with all the danger and wonder that uncharted territory can bring. At the end of the three-month expedition, six of the 10 men and

two of the four boats emerge on the other side of the canyon."

Jackson said in selecting the play, which is an ensemble with 12 different characters, the Sewanee theatre department saw a unique opportunity to highlight the female talent at the University. The play is both female-directed and largely female-led.

"At the time of its writing, 'Men on Boats' playwright J. Backhaus began to write this play and found herself thinking how she wished that she could portray any of these fantastic male characters. This realization of who gets to tell the story and who is silenced propelled her to make a choice about the casting for the show. She indicates in the script that people other than non-white cisgender males should tell this story," Jackson said. "That played a large role in our choosing the show, as did the fact that 'Men on Boats' would provide a rich and adventurous experience and that would work well outdoors at Angel Park."

Rehearsals for the show began in late March, and Jackson said the entire team has been hard at work since.

'In rehearsal, we referred to Powell's actual journal for additional details that would help us. We brought in beloved University Professor Bran Potter to share maps, books, photos, and knowledge of Powell as well as University Outdoors Program director John Benson to help us with basic whitewater rowing and steering techniques for a point of reference."

Also in preparing, Jackson said the cast ticked the box of one very important component—they all got vaccinated.

Jackson added that it is her hope that those who see the production leave with a new appreciation of American history as well as a healthy desire to question why most of said history has been delivered from the perspective of the white male.

"I hope that seeing a non-white cisgender male cast tell the story reminds us that there is room for everybody, that representation matters and that we are better when we are diverse," she said. "As a director, my heart always swells with love and appreciation when I witness genuine moments on stage between actors. The moments can be small and poignant or huge and hilarious—it's when performers connect with one another in a way that transcends the rehearsal process. They lift and illuminate the playwright's story while they support the truth they experience in one another's characters. And they give all those beautiful and funny moments to their audience. It's one of the many reasons I love live theatre. I am so proud of this ensemble.



Four players, Cameron Tyer, C'93, Mary Missbach, C'00, Ga-Liles, C'16, were named the Senior Player of the Year, according to the Intercollegiate Tennis Association

> Three teams (1990, 1999, 2007) and seven individuals have been inducted into the Sewanee Athletics Hall of Fame.

> Along with her husband, John, who serves the University as the Director of Tennis after a stellar career as the men's head coach, the couple have four children, Avery, Sadie, Michaela and Tessa C'24. Sadie played four years of tennis at Middlebury College (Vt.) from 2013-16, while Tessa is a first-year women's tennis athlete at the University of the South, playing sideby-side with her parents.



### **Spring Birds**

Angus Pritchard writes: "Along with most other Sewanee students, I missed spring on the mountain in 2020. This meant there was a palpable sense of excitement for the spring of 2021 -- and we haven't been disappointed. For spring birds, this has been the best season I've had in Sewanee! Highlights have included over a dozen sightings of Cerulean Warbler on the mountain, Blue-winged Warblers in Lost Cove, and a Black-Billed Cuckoo seen by David Coe at the Memorial Cross. Even more exciting, we found Franklin County's first records of Wilson's Phalarope and Long-Billed Dowitcher (found by Dr. Schrader's Ornithology class) and Semipalmated Plover (found by Richard Candler), in a flooded field near Woods Reservoir.

One of my favorite morning spots is the powerline cut by the Memorial Cross. In the morning, listen here for the "pick-e-tuk" of the Summer Tanager, the high-pitched bouncing notes of the Indigo Bunting and the rising buzzy whistle of the Prairie Warbler (pictured). Other great spots around Sewanee are the Mountain Goat Trail, Morgan's Steep and the Potter Ridge Trail. I hope to see you out there!"

**Śtephanie Smith** reported on visits by the Rose-breasted Grosbeaks to her feeders last week: "The first ones came Tuesday, and yesterday we had nine males at one time, and I couldn't count the females. Some of the males are small and may be new. They are beautiful and eat all the time. We've had a black, red, and white week with these, the Red-headed woodpecker, our constant Red-belly woodpeckers, and two pairs of Downy woodpeckers. Amidst all the bird arrivals, we planted the butterfly garden and have welcomed a Pearl Crescent, a Checkerspot, and Swallowtails flying by. We look forward to seeing all our flying visitors soon."


