Debra Magpie Earling Reading

In celebration of Native American Heritage Month, Debra Magpie Earling, author of "Perma Red" and the forthcoming novel "The Lost Journals of Sacajewea," will give a reading at 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 16, in Convocation Hall. A book signing will follow. In addition, she will be making classroom, workshop, and other program visits. She has received both a National Endowment for the Arts grant and a Guggenheim Fellowship.

"Perma Red" won a Spur Award and Medicine Pipe Bearer Award for best first novel from the Western Writers Association, a WILLA Literary Award and the American Book Award. The novel takes place on the Flathead Indian Reservation in the 1940s and portrays the ongoing crisis of missing and murdered indigenous women. "The Lost Journals of Sacajewea" was begun during the bicentennial of the Lewis and Clark expedition to challenge prevailing narratives of Sacajewea.

Earling is a graduate of the University of Washington, and holds both an MA in English (1991) and an MFA in Fiction Writing (1992) from Cornell University.

She retired from the University of Montana, where she was named professor emerita in 2021. She is Bitterroot Salish.

Earling's visit is the first campus-wide event sponsored by the University's Indigenous Engagement Initiative, which is under the aegis of the Division of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and the leadership of Vice Provost Anderson-Thompkins. The goals of the initiative include land acknowledgment, a strong relationship with indigenous communities and the Tennessee Trail of Tears Association, identification and support of courses or research that are relevant to indigenous people, and programming that enriches our knowledge of indigenous heritage and shapes the university into a place that is inclusive for and supportive of indigenous faculty, staff, and students. Sponsorship is partnered with the School of Letters and the University Lectures committee, along with the Sewanee Review, the Department of English and Creative Writing, the Department of Psychology, the Center for Teaching, and the Office of Inclusive Excellence.

63rd Annual Lessons and Carols

On Christmas Eve, 1918, the Chaplain of King's College, Cambridge took a Cornish Christmas tradition and brought it to the world. Weaving together biblical readings with seasonal music, the service prepared participants to hear the announcement of the birth of Jesus Christ. For over 60 years, Sewanee has hosted its own service, and coming as it does at the end of the Advent semester, the gathering becomes, for many, the Christmas celebration of the University. In addition to the students, staff, and faculty of the University, the service is open to the broader community in Sewanee and beyond.

We look forward to welcoming the extended Sewanee family back into All Saints' Chapel in 2022. With seats for more than 1,000 guests, we anticipate being able to seat every person who comes to worship in All Saints' Chapel. Two services, at 7 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 3, and 4 p.m., Sunday, Dec. 4, feature walk-up seating, and doors will open an hour in advance of the service. Tennessee Craft South Promotes Empty Tables Project: Relieving Hunger Creatively

Tennessee Craft South, a local regional chapter of Tennessee Craft, welcomes artists and craftspeople to join in the effort to feed our neighbors. The initiative, Empty Tables, encourages artists to contribute works that celebrate growing, serving, and eating food. These items will be sold during the Tennessee Craft South Studio Tour in the American Legion Hall in Sewanee during the first weekend of December. All proceeds from the sale of the items will be used to combat hunger in the region.

To achieve the goals of the Empty Tables project, in addition to soliciting the help of area artists, Tennessee Craft South is partnering with Sewanee Locally Grown, a local gardeners' market group in Sewanee, Sewanee's Community Action Committee, and Monteagle's Morton Memorial Church. These groups regularly work to address food insecurity in Grundy, Marion, and Franklin counties.

Election Results

Voters went to the polls on Nov. 8. In Tennessee, Gov. Bill Lee (R) received 64.93 percent of the votes. Jason B. Martin (D) received 32.93 percent of the votes.

Scott DesJarlais (R) received 70.57 percent of the votes to Wayne Steele's (D) 25.74 percent of the votes in the race for the 4th Congressional District seat of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Iris Rudder (R) will return to the Tennessee House of Representatives for the 39th District with 76.74 percent of the votes, defeating Democratic candidate Bruce Manuel, who received 23.26 percent of the votes.

There were four proposed amendments to the Tennessee Constitution on the Nov. 8 ballot:

An amendment to Article XI, of the Constitution of Tennessee, relative to the right to work.

An amendment to Article II and Article III of the Constitution of Tennessee, relative to the exercise of the powers and duties of the Governor during disability.

An amendment to Article I, Section 33 of the Constitution of Tennessee, to prohibit slavery and involuntary servitude.

An amendment to Article IX, of the Constitution of Tennessee, relative to disqualifications.

In Tennessee, proposed Constitutional amendments are presented as yes or no questions on the ballot. A yes vote is a vote to amend the Constitution and adopt the proposed language in the amendment. A no vote is a vote not to amend the Constitution and keep the current language in the Constitution unchanged.

Constitutional Amendment 1, Yes, 69.79 percent of the votes; No, 30.21 percent of the votes.

Constitutional Amendment 2, Yes, 74.63 percent of the votes; No, 25.37 percent of the votes.

Constitutional Amendment 3, Yes, 79.54 percent of the votes; No, 20.46 percent of the votes.

Constitutional Amendment 4, Yes, 63.24 percent of the votes; No, 36.76 percent of the votes.

In the Town of Monteagle election, Greg Maloof was elected mayor, defeating incumbent Marilyn Campbell-Rodman. For the Monteagle alderman election, Nate Wilson and Dan Sargent will serve four year terms. Dorraine Parmley and Jessica Favaloro will serve two year terms. Total votes were unknown at press time.

These are unofficial election results and will be certified by the State of Tennessee on Nov. 23.

SCA to Pursue MGT Trailhead Relocation Project

At the Nov. 7 meeting, the Sewanee Civic Association voted to pursue a partnership with the Mountain Goat Trail Alliance, University, and Sewanee Business Alliance to move the official trailhead to 17 Lake O'Donnell Rd., and to transform the former Hair Depot building located at that address to a Welcome and Heritage Center, serving as a resource for residents and visitors alike. The evening's program provided an overview of the services offered by LiveWell, a new solution to aging at home in the Sewanee community.

The official MGT trailhead is currently the Hawkins Lane entrance. The Lake O'Donnell Road address was the location of the freight depot when the Mountain Goat Railroad passed through town. SCA President Kiki Beavers pointed out, "People come in our store [Taylor's Mercantile] every day asking about the history of Sewanee," said SCA Vice President Ken Taylor.

Implementing the proposed two-phase plan would begin with cleanup of the view and parking lot, signage, constructing a gravel path, and racks outside the building offering maps and information. Revisioning the building as a Welcome and Heritage Center would happen in phase two. Grant writing will fall to MGT Director Patrick Dean. The SCA Community Chest will administer the grant as a restricted (i.e., designated use) fund. The SCA will form a committee to advance the project and draft a detailed proposal to present to the University.

Providing background on LiveWell, Executive Director Jane Kelley said Nashville-based Blakelyford Senior Life saw a need for transforming their retirement community model into a community and homebased program. The Sewanee Arcadia project, seeking solutions to aging at home

in Sewanee, contacted LiveWell. Geared to assisting “healthy and independent” people age at home, Sewanee LiveWell, has a registered nurse on-call and helps members organize needed services and bring the services into their home. Kelly compared fees to those at a live-in retirement community where the upfront fee ranged from \$300,00-\$400,000 and the monthly fee from \$300-\$400. The LiveWell program’s monthly fee was similar, according to Kelly, but the upfront fee varied from \$20,000-\$60,000 depending on age, whether the client had long term care insurance, whether persons sharing a household both enrolled, and plan specifics. Nursing home care costs over \$100,000 per year, Kelly said.

“This is an investment in a people’s future,” Kelly insisted. “You know you’re covered even at nursing home level...Seventy percent of those 65 or older will need some care.” The monthly fee typically increased 2-5 percent annually, Kelly noted, although current conditions would require a 6 percent increase in 2023. Fees never increased due to the member needing more care, she stressed. Seven Sewanee residents have committed to enrolling in the program.

Confirming that Arcadia had not abandoned plans for a physical facility in Sewanee, Arcadia board member John Solomon said a survey to gauge demand would be circulated this month.

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Philanthropy Internship Program Celebrates Grants to Local Organizations

The public is invited to a celebration of grants made to organizations on the South Cumberland Plateau on November 18, 2022. The ceremony will take place in Convocation Hall on the University campus at 5 p.m.

The philanthropy internship program is an innovative partnership between South Cumberland Community Fund and the University of the South's Office of Civic Engagement. Interns spend a full year learning about the grants process. In the spring, they shadow SCCF's grants committee, and in the fall, students serve as a grants committee. They learn from guest speakers from the community and from their instructor, Katie Goforth, director of community development for both SCCF and the University.

Every year, as part of the learning experience for the interns, a guest speaker presents his or her perspective on philanthropy at the celebration. This year, the guest speaker will be Scott Satterwhite, president of the William Josef Foundation, and a pioneer of social impact investing. Satterwhite will speak about collaborative grant making, following up on the Make Lasting Connections grant that SCCF made earlier this year to launch a new free medical clinic in Tracy City, and an innovative Housing Hub.

This year's philanthropy internship program grants will fund the following projects:

Arts Inside will create and manage a Mutual Aid Network that will be dedicated to meeting the immediate needs of formerly incarcerated people and other at-risk individuals;

Easy's Dog Shelter will outfit a climate-controlled in-take building for new arrivals;

Folks at Home will provide to senior citizens a resource called "Better Balance: Simple Exercises to Improve Stability and Prevent Falls"; Friends of South Cumberland State Parks, with its partner, South Cumberland Regional Land Trust, will launch a Forest School in partnership with the Cumberland Forest School;

Grundy County Food Bank will provide partial funding towards the purchase of a second walk-in freezer for their new facility;

Grundy County Mayor's Office will create a professional video about Tennessee's South Cumberland region that will encourage tourist visitation to this economically-distressed region; and

Mountain Goat Trail Alliance will develop new signage on the trail.

"These students worked hard on studying these grant proposals and thinking about what would make the greatest positive impact on our community," said Goforth. "Twice a year, we hold grant celebrations that really shine a bright light on the great work that local organizations are doing on the Plateau."

"We are grateful to the many donors who make this program possible," said Tom Sanders, executive director of SCCF. "Our vision is that the South Cumberland Plateau be a place of hope and prosperity for all its residents, and these celebrations provide tangible evidence of hope, just as the grants work toward prosperity."

Babson Center Welcomes Cook Lecture on Nov. 17

John Cook, director of sustainability, Niagara Bottling, LLC, will be the Babson Center's Bryan Viewpoints Speaker for the 2022 Advent semester. He will offer his insights into the growing influence of sustainability directors in businesses given increases in regulatory oversight, climate change risks, activist investing, and consumer and employee social and environmental awareness.

During his visit, Cook will meet with students and faculty. He will deliver a public presentation, "Planting a 'Green' Seat in the C-Suite: Sustainability Leadership," at 4:30 p.m., Thursday, Nov. 17, in the Torian Room at duPont Library. This event is co-sponsored by the Office of Environmental Stewardship and Sustainability, Sewanee Environmental Institute, and the Department of Natural Resources.

Prior to Cook's role at Niagara Bottling, he served as the first director of sustainability at the University of California Riverside where he certified the first LEED Building on campus and installed the first campus PV solar array, among many accomplishments. He also worked as a consultant with Domani Sustainability, re-establishing a corporate recycling program for United Airlines. He started his career in academia and ultimately left for administration and then the for-profit business world, always with a goal of looking at consumption and growth through a sustainability lens.

Since 1963, Niagara Bottling, LLC, has been a family owned and operated company with 47 locations on three continents. It is the largest manufacturer of bottled water in North America and sells a range of products from spring to sparkling water, tea, vitamin enhanced water, and protein nutrition shakes. Niagara Bottling also manufactures private label bottled water for other

companies, such as Costco and Safeway.

During an interview in 2018 with the International Society of Sustainability, Cook admitted that, "working for a bottled water company may seem a bit like an oxymoron for a sustainability officer, or like greenwashing at best. But it is not! At Niagara Bottling, I am working to drive sustainability in all aspects of our operations, our company culture, and our product."

Building on 15 years of work to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, he recently oversaw the installation of more than 65 megawatts of renewable electricity at Niagara that immediately made a positive financial return. After overcoming some internal resistance, Niagara achieved LEED Gold certification for their new headquarters in Diamond Bar, CA, and received support to obtain TRUE Zero Waste certification for 33 of their manufacturing plants.

Cook began his college career at Texas A&M in marine science and as a cadet in the Merchant Marines. He graduated with an honors BA in fine arts studies from York University in Ontario, Canada, and then earned a PhD in Performance Studies from Northwestern University and an MBA in Sustainability Management from Presidio Graduate School. Cook holds accreditation from the International Society of Sustainability Professionals, Alliance for Water Stewardship, TRUE Zero Waste and LEED.

This week we shine the spotlight on Sewanee Elementary. Since 1867 there has been a long-standing relationship between the community and the public school. For years this voluntary community commitment maintained the educational system, such as St. Paul's on the Mountain school and the school on Billy Goat Hill.

When the Sewanee Civitan Club (now the Sewanee Civic Association) was first organized, its objective of good citizenship included "a comprehensive program for the betterment and improvement of every phase of community activity." (Chitty) This included providing school facilities. At that time, the Franklin County Board of Education agreed to pay the salaries of teachers, but did not provide the buildings. The University at that time was unable to help with the expenses. Funding for a new public school became a community goal. The school building would be on University leasehold land, owned by the Sewanee Civitan Club, and operated by the Franklin County School Board.

Funds were raised in the community and the Sewanee Public School was completed in 1927 through volunteer efforts. In 1933, the community built the Roosevelt Addition. In 1943, more than half of the town's SCC budget went to maintain the school, and fund programs for enrichment and the purchase of supplies. The county took over the maintenance of the school in 1955 when the building and land were turned over to the county as long as a school remained on that site.

The Sewanee Elementary School (SES) continues to rely on yearly funding from the SCC to meet the school's needs. This funding commitment "has served the intentional purpose of eliminating the door-to-door fundraising." (Chitty)

The Sewanee Elementary Parent Organization (SES PO), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, requests and disburses the SCC funds each year for SES. All money received is used for yearly support to the school. The SES PO works with teachers and staff to find solutions to specific educational needs of the school that are not met by the Franklin County School system funding or services.

The SCC is the primary source of revenue for the SES PO operating expenses. This year the SES PO will receive \$25,525 general operating support and project-based support if the SCC goal is met.

The money raised for the school will help to fund classroom supplies; the library for new books, and material purchases to make the library more reading friendly; enrichment funds for Friday School, Field Day, and TCAP Carnival; place-based learning for more outdoor classroom experiences; the work study University of the South program to pay part-time student classroom helpers; technology purchases; and professional development funds.

Since 1908, the goal of the Sewanee Community Chest has been to help citizens by funding the community. With Community Chest donations, local organizations provide for basic needs such as books, food, recreational spaces, elder care, children's educational needs, animal welfare, and more. ‘Glimpses of Lives Interrupted’ at the UAG

The University Art Gallery is delighted to present Sisavanh Phouthavong Houghton’s “Glimpses of Lives Interrupted,” on view through Dec. 9, 2022.

Sisavanh Phouthavong Houghton explores experiences of war and displacement, and how they are communicated. Experiences of war remembered, war seen from afar, and war’s aftermath are offered in abstract paintings and sculptural installation.

“Glitched” and map-based landscape paintings combine fragments of images from the Vietnam War with contemporary photographs from Ukraine and Syria – gathered with the hashtag #LiveWar and translated into paint – to invoke the splinters of information, the digital noise, and the repeating patterns of representations of war. Delicate flowers laser-engraved with a bombing data map catch the light and cast shadows on the wall. Lush and gleaming abstractions evoking idyllic landscapes are flooded by converging geometric forms, and speak to displacement and exodus.

In each case, Houghton combines the implacable, overwhelming, and impersonal violence of war with the intimate and personal, and even the sentimental: delicate flowers, teddy bears, memorials that speak of loved ones lost, the unsettling “sickly sweet” emotions that accompany resettlement. Media too are juxtaposed – maps, bombing data, and fragments of photographs and footage are transformed into paint, sculpture, and abstract forms.

A Lao refugee and immigrant whose family fled to the United States, Houghton’s work speaks to her own lived experience, and the fragments and impressions that have remained with her since childhood. It proceeds too from her conviction that while “the terrain, conflicts, and disputes may vary, ... the human war experience does not.”

Beautiful Blue Gentians

Valerie Lorenz writes that she observed Bottle (or Soapwort) Gentian beside Lake Dimmick on Nov. 6. This beautiful blue flower is one of our latest bloomers, although this seems late even for this gentian, perhaps due to our prolonged warm weather. Lin Cameron and Mary Davis had reported the Soapwort Gentian as coming strongly into bloom at the end of September. The water's edge is a good place to look for these and other late bloomers, such as White Turtlehead and Nodding Ladies' Tresses. The "Bottle" name for the gentian comes from the shape of the flowers, which appear not to be open. Bumblebees have to push their way in through the closed tips of the petals, although they sometimes just chew a hole in the side. The gentian flower has a color signal at the tip of the petals so that the bumblebee knows which ones still contain nectar and it doesn't waste its effort. Blue flowers in general seem to attract bumblebees. The "Soapwort" name comes from the soapy sap. Gentians of various species have been used to treat a myriad of ailments. Angostura Bitters contains gentian.
