## Longtime Sewanee Resident Launches New Art Studio

*Sewanee Art Works Now Open*

Martha Keeble has opened a new art studio on the Mountain – Sewanee Art Works – a place where people can explore their creativity and see the powerful impact art can have in their lives.

Located at 38 Ball Park Road (in the space formerly occupied by Crossroads Café), the open, airy studio has space for up to 12 artists. Keeble currently offers two group art lessons each week and plans to add more in the coming months. She is also available for private lessons. Students work in the medium of their preference, on projects of their own choosing.

“I’m here to encourage people to discover their creativity and grow their skills as they learn about art, color, form, and style,” she said.

The studio’s name, Sewanee Art Works, intentionally has two meanings: It is a place for Sewanee Art Works to be created and exist; and, she said, “It is a reminder that art really works. It works on our hearts and our souls. It works to heal and restore. It works in ways we cannot always understand, but I know that art works.”

Keeble has 35 years of experience teaching art to people of all ages. She earned a BFA in Painting/Drawing from the University of Georgia and a Master’s Degree in art education from Georgia State University. Before teaching private lessons full-time, she taught art at St. Andrew’s-Sewanee School and at schools in the Atlanta area.

Her experience traveling around the world at the age of 21, combined with her art training, expanded her interests in metaphysics, mysticism, spirituality, and creativity. “I am attracted to color as a way of finding personal connection between spirit and matter,” Keeble said.

Among her plans for the studio are a Day of the Dead celebration where people can come and create

expressions of love and respect for the departed, scheduled for late October. She will also be available to host private art parties.

“I am so grateful to the Sewanee community for its support of art and creativity,” she said.

## Franklin County Schools: Third Grade Retention 'Concerning'

“It’s very concerning,” said Resources Supervisor Linda Foster at the Sept. 6 Franklin County School Board meeting, asking the board to review recommended changes to the Promotion and Retention policy which stipulate “Third grade students shall not be promoted to the next grade unless they are determined to be proficient in English language arts based on the most recent TCAP test.” The Tennessee School Board Association (TSBA) recommended the policy change to comply with recent action by the state legislature.

If adopted, the policy calls for parental notification a child will be retained and provides for methods to avoid retention including summer school Bridge Camp and fourth grade tutoring. Foster pointed out the school district did “not have to use TSBA’s recommendation... [we need to decide] what we would like to keep and what we would like to adjust.” Director of Schools Stanley Bean said there was “a lot of discussion” about the recommended policy, and there would likely be changes. “The state legislature requires it, and they will have to amend it,” Foster said. “I don’t think they meet again until January. In the meantime, we will

## Sewanee Community Deer Survey

Each year the University conducts a community impact survey about Sewanee’s white tailed deer population and associated hunting program. The survey is intended to quantify impacts of both the white tailed deer and the hunting program on the community.

Decades of botanical research yields a clear understanding of the ecological impacts current deer population levels are having on the Domain, but there are also social impacts that are less easy to quantify. The hunting program was started partially in response to an increase in automobile/deer collisions and many complaints of landscape damage on leaseholds. Balancing these perceived negatives, many leaseholders enjoy seeing deer roam in town and are concerned about an active hunting program close to residences.

The annual community survey is an attempt to understand more about the social context of the herd and the hunt. We use the data to focus hunter effort where social impacts of the deer are the greatest and where the social impact of the hunters is minimized. Eight years of data has shown an overall decline in the number of people concerned about the safety of the hunt, and geographically focused successes and failures in ameliorating the social impacts of the herd.

If you choose to include your address, it will be used to create an impact map used to focus hunting efforts. This survey is the primary tool we use to locate hunter efforts in the community, so whether you are strongly for or against the hunting program, we would like to hear from you.

have to have a policy."

Board member Sarah Liechty asked how many new third grade teachers would be needed. "We're talking about a significant number of kids we'll have to provide summer school or mediation for," Liechty said. Jenny Crabtree, Supervisor of Elementary Education and Federal Projects, suggested, "We can look at our certified ELA [results] from this past spring and that will give us a ballpark number." "We may not need as many fourth grade teachers," Bean said.

The board will take up the recommended policy changes at the Sept. 29 workshop.

The board will also use the workshop to discuss how to repurpose ESSER III funds removed from the budget, freeing up \$4.4 million originally budgeted to be used for an Activity Center. At Crabtree's recommendation the board approved the ESSER III application to the state which takes into account the change in funding allocation. "We have now put that funding into another line ... basically as carry over funds that will be repurposed," Crabtree explained. "If you can approve this broadly, once you have a work session, we can go back in and amend as you request."

A third item at the workshop will be the Extended School Program. Vice Chair Lance Williams noted the self-supporting program was "\$43,000 in the red." Williams asked if the program was still operating. "It closed this past week," Bean said.

The school district will be seeking bids on extensive roof repairs at Broadview, Cowan, Decherd and Sewanee elementary schools in conjunction with an approved ESSER II project. County Finance Director Andrea Smith said contractors could bid on the jobs separately or bid on all four jobs.

Huntland High School received a "collaborative robot" valued at \$12,500 from Nissan Regional Training Center. Previously the two county high schools shared one robot. The technology will aid students in earning 80 hours toward Industrial Maintenance certification at a Tennessee College of Applied Technology.

Sheri Smith, North Middle School counselor, and Eric Vanzant, Director of the Campora Family Resource Center, highlighted progress of the Advancement Committee tasked with supporting county teachers and schools. Teachers recently participated in training on how to deal with student mental health issues, the district has hired four new counselors as well as a social worker, and the committee has applied for grants to bring "Trauma Informed" discipline practices into all schools. At the student level, student of the month recognition was underway with the district wide honoree receiving a \$250 cash award, high school students had begun mentoring elementary and middle school students to "get them excited about the next level of education," and school principals were working to identify a "brand" for their school. Listening tours for district supervisors and school board members were being planned for all the county schools. School board member Linda Jones, who recently visited a school said, "I heard over and over again, our schools want us in their buildings."

As part of the Sunday Forum's year-long look at how communities are formed and shaped, her topic will be "Community in Ancient Israel." Wright is the C. K. 



Janie Schmitt (16:23.0), Grace Cawley (16:35.2), Merrit Newton (16:44.6), McKenzie Bullock Louis (16:47.6) and Charlotte Ganter (16:47.9) rounded out the Sewanee scoring.

The women's team finished as the second-best Division III in the meet, only trailing Emory. Sewanee defeated Oglethorpe, Huntingdon and LaGrange.

Freshman Lane Gamble led the men's Tiger team with an 18:39.4 mark in the 5K race, followed by Christian Shushok's 18:42.8.

Brandon Christ (19:15.1), Alex Coley (19:17.7), Max McCloud (19:19.2), Ian Boer (19:19.2) and Bill Robinson (20:55.0) rounded out the Sewanee scoring.

## Football Dominates in Season Opener

There has been a significant gap in wins for the University of the South football program, but the 2022 edition of the Tigers silenced the narrative early and often on Sept. 3. Sewanee posted its first shutout in almost 14 years with a 50-0 thumping of the College of St. Scholastica (Minn.), inside historic Hardee-McGee Field at Harris Stadium.

After Sewanee was forced to punt on the first drive of the game, CSS fumbled the return and Quinn Johnson picked up the loose ball at the 17-yard-line.

Four plays later, Michael McGhee scored the first touchdown of the season on a five-yard run to the hosts on the board first.

On the Saints' first possession of the game, Johnson was there again. On a third down, the senior sacked Giuliano Villalpando and knocked the ball loose and later picked the ball up for his second fumble recovery of the day.

After a four-yard run by Jeremiah Young, Price Pennington caught an 18-yard touchdown reception to make it 14-0 with 8:15 to go in the opening frame.

Later in the quarter, CSS would fumble the ball deep in their territory, and Michael Showalter picked it at the five-yard line, and the defensive lineman made the short trot to the end zone for a 21-0 score.

Sewanee's fourth touchdown of the game came during a long drive. On the 14th play, Tucker Kirk punched in a one-yard score that saw 7:39 chew off the clock.

After the Saints were sacked on fourth down by Tyler Wright, McGhee made it 34-0 with his second touchdown on the day, recording a one-yard score.

In the third, Kirk had another one-yard punch-in to improve the lead to 41.

Late in the third, once again deep in their territory, the Saints would fumble the ball again, but the nose snuck over the back line for a team safety.

With the game readily in hand, Damerian Wigenton posted a 14-yard run to hit the half-century mark for the first time in nearly 25 years.

Sewanee saw its 22-game losing streak come to an end on Saturday, as the program earned its 490th win in its 127-plus year history.

The Tigers set some new marks, scoring 50 points in a game or more for the 37th time in history. Additionally, it is the first time Sewanee dropped 50 on an opponent since a 56-30 win of Millsaps in November 1997.

The defense, who stood tall for all four quarters, recorded the program's 222nd shutout in program history and first since September 2008 versus Colorado College.

Sewanee rushed for 278 yards on 49 carries, averaging 5.7 yards per handoff. Freshman Damerian Wigenton led the running game with 79 yards on 11 carries and a score. Senior Michael McGhee added two scores and 66 on the ground, while Kirk added two more rushing touchdowns.

Jeremiah Young totaled 148 passing yards on 14-of-23. Dagem Samuel led the receiving core with 50 yards, while Price Pennington recorded the lone score through the air.

For the offense, the Tigers totaled 75 plays for 450 yards, while limiting the Saints to 114 yards.

Quinn Johnson forced one fumble and recorded two, while adding one sack. Zion Morris, Tyler Wright and Michael Showalter all added a sack each.

Keegan Glaze led the tackling with eight on the day.

### Reports from the Field: Birds

**Lin Cameron** reports a “tiny gem I found growing a few weeks ago on a deep, dark trail past Otey View.” Sewanee Herbarium staff confirmed the identification as Three-Birds Orchid, *Triphora trianthophoros*, and that it had not been officially documented yet on the Domain. It is called three birds because the flowers are often borne in threes and look like birds in flight. Lin “went back to try to find more but the squirrels or some such had totally tilled up the area where they were growing. So maybe next year...” This experience is typical for this orchid, considered infrequent in Tennessee. It only grows in rich and damp woodland humus, often under beech. It is rather tiny, only a few inches high, and the flowers only last a few days at the most. It only blooms under very specific conditions, in late summer, in the afternoon, perhaps after a cold night, and the flowers all open at once. It can persist as underground tubers, perhaps what the squirrels or whoever were after in digging up the patch of orchids.

**John Palisano** reports: “On two different occasions over the two weeks, I have seen birds the size of wrens and what looked like an elongated beak drinking from the hummingbird feeder in my yard. On Aug. 29, 2022, I did find and photograph a male hairy woodpecker that was drinking from the same hummingbird feeder. Has anyone else reported seeing a woodpecker of any other bird species feeding from a hummingbird feeder?” Please let Nature Notes know!

## Volunteers Needed Sept. 17 to Help Staircase Project at Greeter Falls

The Friends of South Cumberland State Park (FSC) are looking for volunteers to help them move lumber and other construction materials down to the site of a new trail staircase project at Greeter Falls in Savage Gulf on National Public Lands Day, Saturday, Sept. 17.

“This volunteer day is an important part of our larger effort to improve many parts of the access trail to Greeter Falls,” explained FSC Trails Chair John Collins. “The Savage Gulf West trailhead, which leads to Greeter Falls, is one of the three busiest trailheads in South Cumberland, and as a result, the original trail is worn, eroded and very difficult to navigate in some places. On Saturday, Sept. 17, we hope to change that by delivering to our work-site the materials we'll use to construct an all-new staircase later on this fall. We need lots of help to do that, and hope everyone who's able can join us from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on that day.”

Collins explained that the FSC Trails Team, working with SCSP Rangers, has spent the past nine months building or renovating trail sections along much of the route down to Greeter Falls. He noted that the new staircase will greatly improve response times for EMTs and Park Rangers, in the event a park visitor is injured while visiting Greeter Falls. The staircase project will connect two of those segments and mark the completion of what is the first phase of an even larger project to improve trails in South Cumberland State Park.

Volunteers are asked to pre-register for the event from a link on the home page of the FSC website at <[FriendsOfSouthCumberland.org](http://FriendsOfSouthCumberland.org)>. There, they can see plans for the staircase and learn more about volunteering for the event. All volunteers are encouraged to bring plenty of water and a high-energy snack, wear sturdy shoes and bring work gloves, if available.

“We'll be moving a number of long boards and posts, with a person on each end. You should be able to lift 25 to 30 pounds in order to do that, but if you'd just like to come to hand out water and help direct traffic, that's fine, too,” Collins added. “Please be on time, 9 am sharp, at the Savage Gulf West/Greeter Falls trailhead off Highway 56 between Altamont and Beersheba Springs. We'll have a brief orientation session, and then we'll get started.”

FSC's Trails Team hopes to have the new staircase completed and open by the end of 2022. A second staircase, just above the Greeter Falls Plunge Pool, is planned as a 2023 project, subject to funds being raised in the interim. Donations can be made via the “Make a Gift” page on the FSC website.

This hike will take place weather permitting. Note: The areas around overlooks can be treacherous in terms of keeping your footing. The potential to slip and fall exists, and extreme care is needed.
